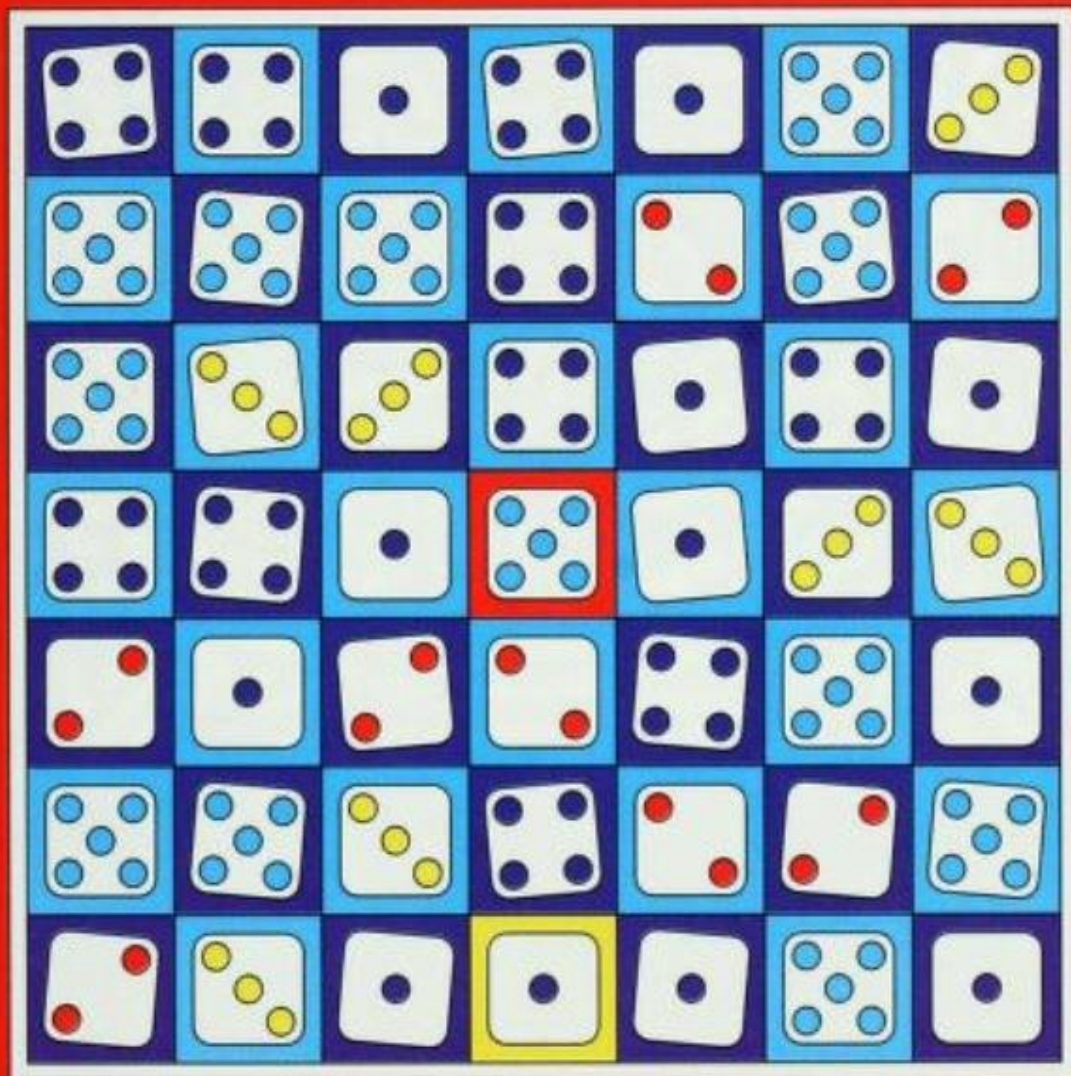

## Grandma’s Garden

Stooping to the ground, Grandma would smell the sweet, scarlet flowers. When people gawked at her garden, there was little noise and Grandma would stand as proud as a peacock. Occasionally, a bee’s buzzing would break the silence and the giggles of children would echo through the neighborhood.

As Grandpa spoke his face would change. Instead of recalling fond memories, his face would become sad as he remembered the day Grandma’s heart was broken.

*“At that time there were lots of children in the neighborhood and they loved racing down our long street. On the last day of summer, the children were having their final race. The winner would become the best runner of the summer. So focused on winning the race, the children sprawled out all over the road and into people’s yards. That’s when it happened. The neighborhood children came barreling towards Grandma’s flowers. Grandma’s eyes filled with tears as she watched the children trample her beautiful daises. 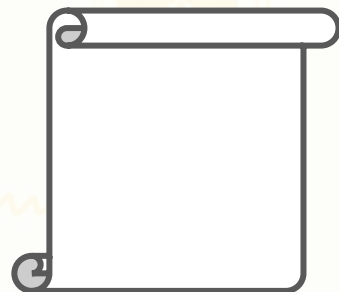

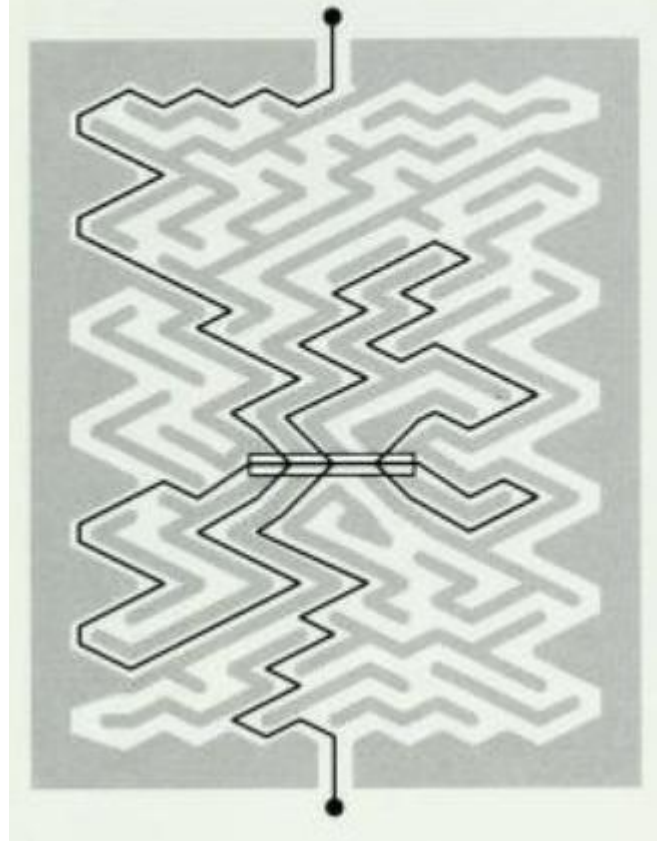

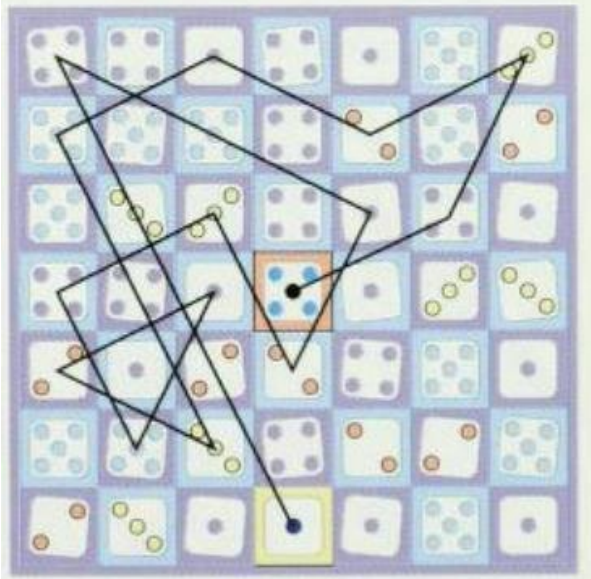
